Approved Sales at Temporary Events and Farmer's Markets

Temporary Events

A Temporary Food Establishment License is required (unless noted*) "Temporary food establishment" means a food establishment that operates for a period of no more than 14 consecutive days in conjunction with a single event or celebration. An "event or celebration" is a significant occurrence or happening sponsored by a civic, a business, an educational, a government, a community, or veterans' organization and may include athletic contests. For example, an event does not include a single store's grand opening or sale.

****Examples of Temporary Events:** Fairs, Festivals, Craft Shows, Vendor Fairs

Food items approved for sale at temporary events:

- Food items prepared on site, from start to finish, the day of the event in thelicensed food stand
- Food items prepared off site from the event, in the food stand owner's licensed facility, and transported to event (receipts for prepared foods may be required)
- <u>All food</u> provided at temporary events must come from an approved (licensed) facility
 Exemptions:
 - Nonprofit organization are allowed to sell non-potentially hazardous foods from unapproved (unlicensed) facilities

**A Temporary Food Establishment License is not required for sales of commercially prepared prepackaged non-potentially hazardous foods (foods that do not require refrigeration) that are produced in a licensed facility.

Food is defined as: a raw, cooked, or processed edible substances, ice, beverages, or ingredients used or intended for use or for sale in whole or in part for human consumption, or chewing gum.

Farmer's Markets

"Farmers market" means a marketplace which operates seasonally, principally as a common market for Iowa-produced farm products on a retail basis for consumption elsewhere.

Food items approved for sell at a farmers market (without a Farmer's Market License):

- Fresh fruits and vegetables which are whole and uncut
- Bakery products which are not potentially hazardous. These products include only the following items: breads, cakes, doughnuts, pastries, buns, rolls, cookies, biscuits, and pies (except meat pies). The following products are examples of bakery products that are potentially hazardous and *cannot* be sold at farmers market without a license: soft pies, custard filled products and cream filled products.
- Fresh Wholesome Shell Eggs
- Honey (products containing honey would have to be individually evaluated)
- Non-potentially hazardous food products: products that do not require refrigeration. These products can be prepared in the home, to be sold for consumption off-the-premise. Some examples of products that can be prepared in the home for direct sale to consumer customers include: jams, jellies, candies and dried noodles. (Only jams and jellies that meet the Standard of Identity for jams and jellies specified in <u>21 CFR Part 150</u> are exempt from licensing at a Farmer's Market)
- Home Canned fruits and vegetables are not allowed to be sold at a Farmer's Market unless they are produced in a licensed kitchen.
- Foods prepared using a specialized process are not allowed to be sold at a Farmer's Market unless they are produced in a licensed kitchen.

**Food sales requiring a Farmers Market License include prepared foods which require temperature control for food safety. All ingredients (including eggs) used in food preparation must come from a licensed and approved source, with the exception of honey and whole uncut fruits and vegetables. A Farmer's Market License is an annual license which allows a vendor to sell potentially hazardous foods at Farmer's Markets in the County that it is issued for. If the vendor operates at Farmer's Markets across various Counties, then a Farmer's Market license must be obtained for each County.

Other Licenses that may be required to sell food:

- Food Establishment License- covers Food Service, Retail Food, and Mobile Food licenses
- Food Processing Plant License
- Home Bakery License
